Councillor Bannister reports that during the last year, Ledbury has been faced with a succession of large planning applications many of them speculative, from a range of big developers.



• A speculative application was made by Bovis to build 140 homes south of the bypass near to the Barratt Homes development and requiring yet another round-about on Leadon Way. This has been approved by HC, we await further details on this development.

• Deeley's speculative application to build a Lidl supermarket, a Nursery and a Medical centre on land south of Leadon Way adjacent to the Barratt Homes development has been refused by HC, strongly supported by LTC objections. Detailed studies of the trade diversion affecting the town centre and near town centre stores showed very significant impact on footfall which would be very detrimental to the town centre and conservation area. LTC's own research revealed that with two discount supermarkets in Ledbury the town would be over-supplied with discounters by more than a factor of 3 compared to the national average.

- Development applications which have been approved and supported by LTC include 93 affordable homes on land behind the Full Pitcher Pub, and a 64 bed Care Home off Martins Way
- Very recent is an application for the demolition of the old auction rooms on Market Street and the construction of 31 apartments with associated parking and infrastructure in the heart of the conservation area.

As we step into 2021 with some uncertainty, I am positive that together the council and residents can make a big difference to the town this year.

Councillor Knight, Chair of Environment and Leisure Committee is very excited to share with you the councils plans to transform the Skatepark and replace some play equipment at the Recreation Ground. Councillor Knight also announces that the council will be providing play equipment that is disability friendly. All families should have the opportunity to enjoy the amenities that Ledbury has to offer, let us work together to make them better for all.

Although we feel like writing off last year, it is important to remember the good things the Council achieved, including opening the Chapel before Christmas for those who have lost loved ones to light a candle in memory, the Council providing over 100 presents to local children in need over the Christmas period, and we adopted a Climate Emergency Declaration along with many other Parish Councils.

### WAR MEMORIAL UPDATE

At a recent meeting of Full Council, Members agreed to obtaining further quotes for the replacement of the slabs around the War Memorial. The Council is also aware of the damage to the vases and the need to seal and clean the War Memorial, which will be discussed in the next Environment and Leisure Committee in March. for more updates please see our webiste.

Thank you to those who have taken time to provide advice and information on this matter.



Councillor Eakin reports that After much deliberation, the Council has passed a budget of £571,081 for the incoming financial year, equating to an increase of £1.36 per month for each Band D household.



This budget is the product of a rigorous process of debate and consideration by both the FPGP Committee and the Council at large, and I would like to thank my fellow councillors, and our wonderful staff, for all the work they put into making it happen. Their efforts led to a great deal of fat being cut from earlier drafts of the budget, allowing us to increase the precept by as little as feasibly possible, while still expanding our staff, and thereby our services to the people of Ledbury.

# **SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL MARKET**



The Charter Market, run by the Town Council, is a twice-weekly retail market held in the Ledbury High Street and under the Market House. The market is held every Tuesday and Saturday, except on a Tuesday in October due to the annual Mop Fair). The historical market has run since 1584 in Ledbury and comprises of approximately 12 stalls. We offer one stall free to charities.

The market offers a wide range of produce including food (meat, fish, fruit and vegetables, cheese, bread, cakes) and clothes, shoes, bags, jewellery, watches, Flowers, and plants.

#### Covid -19 lockdown

Following queries from members of NABMA and the NMTF, we interpret the regulations and the guidance to mean the following product categories are understood to be essential goods:

- Food and grocery including confectionery and off-sales alcohol; cafes and hot food stalls must be takeaway only
- Household goods including cleaning products, sanitary products, and baby products NOT clothing, homewares and home furnishings
- Hardware supplies including repair services and batteries for household items
- Bicycles including parts and repair services
- Pet supplies
- Newsagents
- Plants including shrubs, and horticultural items NOT flowers
- Face coverings

Similar to safety measures currently being carried out at local supermarkets, there will be restricted social distancing guidelines to help people shop as safely as possible. Shoppers are encouraged to use contactless payment and not cash at those stalls where this is possible.

Ledbury Charter Market is operating on a Tuesday and Saturday as normal to give residents access to essential items in a safe outdoor shopping experience. This will include food items, pet food, hardware, and plants. When visiting, please continue to shop safely and adhere to social distancing guidelines. The market is open every Tuesday from 8am until 5pm and Saturday from 8am until 5pm (depending on footfall) in Ledbury High Street and under the Market House. The Town Council will announce when the government guidelines return to normal trading and when our usual traders can return.

# **CLIMATE CHANGE WORKING PARTY UPDATE**

We've been meeting regularly via Zoom to gather and share Information and develop an action plan. We've had a presentation from Herefordshire Council on waste management and one from Garden Organic on promoting waste reduction. We're looking at ways to reduce the use of single use plastics and will be preparing recommendations on this to put to the Environment and Leisure Committee.

We've also had a meeting with Herefordshire Green Network (HGN). The Town Council have joined the network so that we can share information on 'green issues' within the county and benefit from the workshops they run.

We've asked the Town Council to consider getting a 'License to cultivate' from Herefordshire Council so that volunteers can carry out some conservation work on the Town Trail. Sustainable Ledbury has volunteers who are keen to do this work and hope to be able to make a start once the license is agreed and current restrictions are lifted.

The Council would like to reduce its 'carbon footprint'. A good start is to be able to

# Ledbury Town Council NDP

In the December Newsletter we advised that during early Spring we would be completing all the evidence gathering and writing up the supporting documents to draft the first version of the revised NDP. Work on getting a first draft completed by the end of March is now well advanced. A number of volunteers have helped with gathering information, taking photographs and writing up 'topic guides' on development issues such as employment, green spaces, medical and football facilities. Active consultation is taking place with potentially impacted organisations, local community groups, and businesses, with several hundred letters delivered asking them for contributions they would like the NDP to reflect.

It's not too late for anyone to suggest ideas please send your contributions to the Town Clerk by email to clerk@ledburytowncouncil.gov.uk or in writing to the Town Council offices letterbox.

During March you will be able to see content added to the NDP pages on the Council website in readiness for a round of public consultations on the draft NDP document, expected to take place during April and May, so you can familiarise yourself with the way the plan is shaping up in advance. But don't worry, even if you have not been able to contribute to the draft plan, there will be plenty of opportunity and a well-advertised consultation programme with a questionnaire to complete, for anyone wishing to add their thoughts before the final draft of the new plan is produced from all the feedback. # **WELCOME LEDBURY'S TOWN CRIER**



### "Oyez, oyez, oyez!"

Ledbury Town Council are pleased to welcome Mr Fray as Ledbury's newest Town Crier. The Town Crier's responsibility is to announce latest news or events to the residents of Ledbury.

The Town Crier can be traced back at least to medieval times: two Criers appear in the Bayeaux Tapestry, which depicts the invasion of England by William of Normandy and the Battle of Hastings in 1066.

Oyez' (pronounced 'oh yay') comes from the French ouïr ('to listen') and means "Hear ye". The town crier would begin his cry with these words, accompanied by the ringing of a large hand bell to attract attention. It was the job of the Crier to inform the townspeople of the latest news, proclamations, bylaws and any other important information, as at this time most folk were illiterate and could not read. The cry would then end with the words, 'God save the King' or 'God save the Queen'.

Town criers were protected by law. Anything they did was done in the name of the monarch, therefore to harm a town crier was an act of treason. This was a necessary safeguard as the town criers often had to announce unwelcome news such as tax increases!

Did you know, when a group of town criers get together, for example for a competition, it is known as a 'a bellow of criers'?

### CLOCK CHIMES AND TUNES ARE HEARD ONCE AGAIN FROM THE CHURCH TOWER IN LEDBURY

There have not been too many signs of a return to normality in Ledbury this year so far, but the sound of the clock and carillon chimes coming once again from the tower of the Parish Church, punctuating each day, are a very welcome reminder of better times past and to come. The reinstallation of the 22 hammers that strike the outside of the bells to ring the quarter hours, chime the hours and play a hymn tune four times each day marks the end of a three year project to repair and restore the bells, and to make substantial improvements to the inside of the tower.



As soon as it is possible, the bellringers will be itching to show the people of Ledbury the much improved interior of the 13th century tower which they feel will and should be one of the principal tourist attractions of the town. The focus now, following the raising of  $\pounds 280,000$  for the work on bells and tower, is to raise just a little more to enable the full implementation of an education programme which will be based on a new exhibition space at the bottom of the tower and teaching people to ring the bells using the latest available technology. A new training bell (a safe way to take the first steps in learning to ring) is already installed and waiting for the first students!

Butcher Row House Museum features many items of local interest including reproduction helmets and breastplates that would have been worn in the Battle of Ledbury in 1645 and a small collection of musical instruments ranging from a 'hurdy-gurdy' to a Tibetan pipe fashioned from a thigh bone.

This is a great opportunity for those who love to meet new people and jump into the history of our wonderful market town.

The ringers are also responding to a national call to prayer by the Archbishops and will be ringing a bell each evening at 6.00 pm for the next few weeks.

As well as the free tower open days that will take place on Saturdays from time to time, the ringers are offering a specially tailored package for a group of four people that will introduce them to all aspects of the theory and practice of bellringing, and its history. It will include a visit to the parapet at the top of the tower, a ringing lesson (theory and practice), seeing the clock and carillon in action and many other elements including refreshments.
