LEDBURY'S SPEED WATCH GROUP

Did you know Ledbury has its own Community Speed Watch Group?

Ledbury Community Speed Watch is supported by the West Mercia Police but managed and run by volunteers in the community. The scheme enables residents to take an active role in making local people safer.

Speed monitoring events aim to encourage fellow residents and visitors to drive at a safe and appropriate speed, and to address concerns from local people about cars speeding through their neighbourhood.

Ledbury Speed Watch operates within guidelines set by West Mercia Police Road Safety Team at authorised locations which have shown to be of public concern. If you think there is a location in Ledbury that suffers from traffic speeding please don't hesitate to report it either to your local Police Station and/or to Ledbury Community Speed Watch Co-ordinator, Sue Hughes. If we do not already monitor that location we can start a procedure to take action.

We are always looking for volunteers to help with the Speed Watch group. The scheme is open to anyone aged 17 or over and volunteers will only be accepted onto a scheme once appropriate police checks have been carried out. Chair, Christina Vass said "the award is a true community team effort, from Ledbury Town Council who supply and water the hanging baskets which the judges commented upon, to our sponsors who fund our efforts and the nurserymen who supply our plants and of course our small but dedicated team of volunteer gardeners.

This year the Judges visited and were impressed by the Ledbury Allotments; the children's gardening efforts at Busy Bees; and the Methodist Church team who care for the millennium garden at the entrance to the Bye Street car park. Christina added that "sadly, this may be the last year that the current team enter the competition for the foreseeable future. But competition or no competition the team will continue to ensure Ledbury Blooms".





VOICES OF THE DISTRICT WARD COUNCILLORS' REPORTS



COUNCILLOR STEF SIMMONS

Title: Vice Chairperson of Herefordshire Council

Party: The Green Party Ward: Ledbury South

Herefordshire Council News

Full Council Meeting - A meeting of all ward councillors at Full Council on Friday 10th October resulted in almost unanimous support for two Green Party motions on a Child Friendly Herefordshire, and 16–19-year-olds bus travel. A Liberal Democrat motion was also passed on opposing changes to PCSO shift hours.

Green Waste Service - Residents can now sign-up to a new, subscription based, garden waste collection service starting in March next year (2026). This new service will replace the current garden waste collection, which uses single-use plastic sacks. Instead, residents will receive either a wheelie bin or reusable garden sacks, depending on available space at the property. The waste will be collected every two weeks, excluding two weeks at Christmas, and then turned into soil improver which will be available to buy at local recycling centres. The service is flexible, and residents can share bins with neighbours, add extra bins for larger gardens, or use reusable sacks if space is limited. The new service costs £60 per year, which equates to £2.40 per collection, plus a one-off delivery fee of £10 per bin. Residents can now sign-up to a greener, cleaner, more convenient way to manage garden waste - Herefordshire Council

Spatial Plan Progress - In December 2024 the government significantly increased housing targets with 27,600 new homes over 20 years allocated to Herefordshire. The draft Local Plan that residents responded to had to go back to the drawing board, with a new strategy required to accommodate this widely acknowledged unachievable level of growth. A motion brought to Full Council by Independent's for Herefordshire (Cllr Harvey) calling for push back to Government on the target for Herefordshire was widely supported. Any site allocations must be backed by strong evidence that they can be delivered within the plan period (2025-2045). The council is gathering as much information as possible on potential sites and the various constraints including flooding, statutory designations, agricultural grades, water supply etc. The Call for sites has now been extended to try and ensure land is identified for employment and other uses alongside the additional housing required.

Ward News

The Southend - Police have confirmed following deployment of their automatic traffic monitoring device in September that speeding on Gloucester Road/The Southend is a real problem with 85% percentile speeds of 37mph in close proximity to John Masefield School. This is despite installation of the Speed Indicator Device and police enforcement activity with spot checks over recent months. I have met with highways, police and safety officers to look at next steps and I am working with the school and residents to lobby for a solution.

John Masefield High School/Ledbury Primary School Travel Planning - Earlier this month I met with

Dr John Holmes (Headteacher) to look at how pupils travel to school and how Herefordshire Council can support the school with new travel planning capability, as a way of encouraging switch to sustainable travel modes and access funding for measures that support this. The council have been encouraged by the support for buses, walking and cycling in Ledbury from recent consultation events and Ledbury is the first to benefit. Officers are coming to Ledbury next week to walk some of the routes to school.

Eastnor – The A438 from Eastnor Castle towards Ledbury is finally scheduled for resurfacing 10th – 14th November. This will now be done under lights and convoy system to ensure access due to the closure of the Worcester Rd at British Camp. It is intended that improvements will also be made to the signage and road markings at the School/Woodshed junction.

Other Meetings, Events and Activities

Over the last month (in addition to ward case work and role on planning committee) I have been co-opted onto two task and finish groups on inequality and social mobility, and housing development and public consultation. I have provided a talk on planning to members of Sustainable Ledbury. As Vice Chair of Herefordshire Council, I have attended the Battle of Britain 85th Anniversary commemorations in Rosson-Wye, the SSAFA Concert at Hereford Cathedral and the Armed Forces Covenant meeting at The Cyber Ouarter.

Local Access Forum

Ledbury PFO Ian Fountaine has been accepted as a new member of the Local Access Forum and I look forward to working alongside him to improve access for everyone to the countryside.

Ledbury Primary School Travel Plan

Ledbury Primary School Deputy Head, Charlotte Slocombe has discussed the challenges that families living at Hawk Rise face to get their children to school on time. There are 69 children from Ledbury Primary School who live at Hawk Rise. Most of them drive, 21 walk to school, and some rely on the bus. The 476 bus arrives at Tesco either one hour before the school gates open, or at 9.35am. Some families opt for the later bus and this is affecting the school's attendance figures. Last week Stef and I met with Charlotte and Ffion Norton (Transport Planning Services Manager), to discuss Travel Plans for Ledbury Primary and JMHS. Travel Plans are intended to identify measures to support sustainable travel and assess funding needs.

Talk Community

Aimee Williams, who has done such brilliant work here in Ledbury as our Talk Community Development Officer, is moving roles to support Bromyard and we'll be welcoming Philippa Lydford into the Ledbury role. Talk Community have launched the Playstreets scheme in Herefordshire. Playstreets will enable residents to apply for temporary street closures, creating safe, traffic-free spaces for children to play and neighbours to connect. Funding is available to provide kits, resources, and simple guidance for the first 50 participating streets, helping to kick-start this proven model. More info on the Talk Community website.

Flooding and Drainage Issues

Flooding and drainage problems remain outstanding in Wellington Heath. Although assurances have been provided by officers that work to renew a collapsed pipe under the highway in Wellington Heath is scheduled for the week of Monday, 1 December. The Clerk was encouraged to apply for a drainage grant to deal with the drainage issues on Upperfields caused by water running out of Doghill Wood and down the footpaths connecting to Bank and Homend Crescents, clogging drains with gravel and silt. Councillors are asked to encourage members of the public to continue to report blocked drains using the 'Report It' function on the Herefordshire Council website, so that these can be cleared before further heavy rainfall occurs. https://www.herefordshire.gov.uk/report-problem

Police

Councillors met with the Chief Constable and Police & Crime Commissioner after Full Council at Hereford on 10 October. West Mercia Police have announced significant in-year funding issues, and councillors supported a motion at council which expressed concern at the community impact of the changes already made to the working hours of PCSOs in order to save on out-of-hours payments. The force overall is needing to find inyear savings in excess of £20m and over 300 civilian support staff and data analysis experts have been made redundant already with more cuts in technical and support services yet to come.

Developments & Planning

Viaduct Development – phase 2A– an application is under consideration for an interim approval to continue development on this site over the winter whilst not coming forward with the proposed complete phase 2 & 3 plans for the overall scheme. This is very disappointing, as it continues uncertainty regarding the delivery of the 3+ hectares of promised employment land and what exactly is being proposed by Bloor Homes regarding the areas of the site local people know are blighted by flooding. There are a number of issues with the 2A proposals, including the suggestion that this phase of the development under-delivers on affordable housing, with the suggestion that the shortfall is addressed by the, as yet, unplanned future phases. Residents continue to complain that the necessary litter and dog waste bins have not been installed along the pedestrian pathways connecting Phase 1 to the rest of the town, leading to dog waste being abandoned in an unhygienic and unsightly manner along the route.

Transport Infrastructure

Bus Infrastructure: Ward members will be meeting with officers later this month to discuss options evaluated to improve the provision of bus infrastructure for the town. I have requested that a pull-in/stop be provided at the Bromyard Road access to the Bloor development and that commissioned school transport services include a stop at this location so that children can access this transport without having to walk through the undeveloped site to reach bus stops at the Station and on the Hereford Road.

Town Traffic Study

Ward members continue to press for action from officers regarding the traffic study undertaken in the spring of this year at points around the town. Officer churn at Hereford has impacted on the work and assurances are being sought that progress will be made.

St Katherine's Car Park

As part of the repair and maintenance work currently being undertaken on The Master's House, work has been undertaken to lay new paving in the vicinity of the payment machine in the middle of the car park. Unfortunately the opportunity has not been taken to relocate the machine which is necessary to progress agreed plans for a revised layout of the car park to improve traffic flow and deliver agreed landscaping improvements. Property officers appear to be unaware of the agreed plans and the designs, but as yet undelivered, phase 2 & 3 of the landscaping plans. I have requested that the council's Project Management Office (responsible for the phase 1: St Katherine's Square project) liaise with the Property Team to ensure a more joined-up approach to this and future works.

Enforcement

14 High Street – I met with officers from the Economic Development Team on site to discuss how the shop frontage and windows could be smartened up whilst enforcement action is pursued against the property owner. Storesbrook Bridge – The landowner has agreed to remove the unauthorised signage located adjacent to the bridge. Empty Properties: A number of empty properties have been reported to the council for action to encourage their return to occupation.

Residents' Issues

I have been dealing with issues raised by residents and businesses including:

- Planned closure of the Bromyard Road during structural works at the station by Network Rail
- Planning application issues
- Road repairs and drainage in Wellington Heath
- Parking permits in Belle Orchard
- Parking issues in Market Street
- Delivery of improved healthcare and emergency service facilities through One Public Estate
- Attending 'Sick of Ledbury' event at the Community Hub

Committee Work

I have attended Full Council, Group Leaders' and Employment Panel meetings at Herefordshire Council. I have undertaken refresher mandatory training on a range of council and committee issues, and attended a Scrutiny Management Board workshop in preparation for scrutinising the council's 2026-27 budget. I am continuing to participate in a Working Group considering options to address concerns raised by the Boundary Commission regarding rebalancing elector numbers across wards in Herefordshire. I have represented Herefordshire Council on the West Mercia Police & Crime Panel and the Lower Severn Drainage Board and shall be attending the West Mercia Police & Crime Panel again on 5 November to continue challenge on the implementation of service cuts and delivery of savings plans.

On 4 October the Swedes celebrate 'Cinnamon Bun Day' 'Kanelbullens Dag' and have been doing so since 1999. This cinnamon spiced doughy treat is an essential part of 'Fika' a social institution in Sweden, meaning to take a break with colleagues or friends and enjoy coffee and a sweet treat, usually a 'Kanelbullar'.

On Friday 7 November, 'Strömstad in Light' was celebrated. The focus of the festival was on solar energy, lighting, charging of electric cars, and energy efficiency. Alongside this was a rich cultural programme with dance and music, local food crafts and tasting, a wide range of children's activities etc. Very much a community event to bring people together and light up a dark November evening. The weekend continued with nature hikes and cosy coffee events.

At the beginning of December, Restaurants will begin serving the Christmas Buffet or Julbord. Christmas Ham, pickled herring, shrimps, meat balls, Jansson's Temptation etc. are the key features with Hot Glogg (Mulled Wine) and Pepparkaka and beautifully crafted Gingerbread Houses on display.

Other news, the Twinning Association are in the course of developing a new display area in the Market House, with re-designed hanging boards and pop up banners and images and artefacts gathered over the last twenty-five years. This will enable the Twinning to be more visible to visitors and for special events to be held there. It is hoped that this new space will be launched during the Spring.

Links between Ledbury Primary School and the Skee Skola have been initiated and students at John Masefield High School are exchanging letters with students at the Strömstiernaskolan in Strömstad.

MASEFIELD MATTERS PROJECT



Back in October, Masefield Matters took 15 pupils and two teachers to visit The National Maritime Museum and Cutty Sark. The young people on the trip were around the same age as Masefield had been when he was taken away from school to train in the Merchant Navy, giving the pupils a chance to step into the young Masefield's shoes.

We started off the day with a visit to the National Maritime Museum (right), where the students got the chance to visit a range of exhibitions, including the Astronomy Photographer of the Year exhibition. After visiting the museum we took a short walk through Greenwich to get to Cutty Sark, a Victorian tea clipper that is now a museum ship.



The young people then had the chance to explore the ship, where they learned about the reasons the ship was built and international trade in the Victorian era as well as about life on board the ship and how it was navigated. The top deck was set up as it would have been when the ship was sailing. From here there was access to the crew's quarters and the ship's wheel. The young people were particularly interested in the seaman's quarters and workshops.

From the top deck, the young people could even climb the rigging of the ship! Some were extremely excited to climb halfway up the height of the main mast, whereas others bravely climbed despite their nervousness. Some climbers loved it so much they had another go.

Mr. Morgan, one of the teachers, then read John Masefield's 'Cargoes' and explained Masefield's connection with the sea.

Headmaster Dr John Holmes said "It was a fantastic opportunity for them, and I am very grateful, as are they and their families."

For some of the young people, this was a rare chance to travel outside of Ledbury, or to take part in activities like the rigging climb. We will be following up the day's visit with further activities with John Masefield High School to involve them with Masefield's work and in the creation of the memorial.

Masefield Matters is a project run by Ledbury Town Council aiming to explore the legacy of Ledbury-born poet John Masefield through a range of events celebrating his life and work. The project will finish with a memorial celebrating John Masefield's 150th anniversary in 2028.
