Ledbury Health Practice – GP out of hours service survey

The current contract for GP out of hours service provision is due to expire in July 2026. As part of the work that the ICB is doing to commission a new service, they would like to hear people views and experience to identify any necessary changes to the service. Ledbury Minor Injuries Unit

At the last full council meeting I spoke about Ledbury's Minor Injuries Unit, which is the only remaining MIU in Herefordshire. A motion was passed for the reintroduction of Herefordshire MIUs which closed during COVID and have not reopened, and the Council will take this up with the ICB. There's confusion over what our MIU can offer. Its opening times don't include evenings and weekends, and its limited diagnostic facilities mean that if you need an x-ray you'll be sent to Hereford. It's meant to be a walk-in facility but recently patients have been sent away and told to phone 111 to book an appointment. If you try and find out about the MIU through the Ledbury Healthcare Practice website you'll find no mention of it because it's operated by Shaw Healthcare. We have asked Herefordshire Healthcare to contact Shaw Healthcare to address these issues.

Ledbury Health Practice Patient Participation Group

The PPG has published a new residents' leaflet with information about what the practice offers and how to register. This is being distributed through Bloor and Vistry, and is available to estate agents and any organisation that works with new residents.

Road Resurfacing

The schedule of works for £11 million investment into our roads has been published Herefordshire road investment – Herefordshire Council

In my ward it includes resurfacing A438 Hereford Road from Hereford Roundabout to Bush Pitch, which will be closed between 8am – 5pm every day from Friday 4th April to (and including) Monday 14th April 2025. Schedules often change, because of bad weather and other priorities which is frustrating for residents, especially since the information online is not updated. I have raised this with the Highways team.

Definitive Map Modification Orders and commissioning accurate digital records of our Highways

This Friday I have a meeting with Jessie Norman MP, and am sharing information with Ellie Chowns MP who cannot be at the meeting. I am asking our Herefordshire MPs to persuade Government to initiate a cross-party project led by the Geospatial Commission, to produce an accurate digital highway record, and find a solution to the current unworkable plan for updating the Definitive Map. The current plan for updating the Definitive Map requires an application for each modification. With its current resources Herefordshire Council is processing 5 applications for modification per year at a cost of c£20,000 each. The back-log of 250 means 50 years work and a cost of £5,000,000!

Ledbury South Ward Report March 2025 – Cllr Stef Simmons

Children's Services - The most recent Ofsted inspection report shows some positive change in Herefordshire's children's services. Inspectors reviewed the progress made in several areas identified at the last inspection including child protection, emergency action, child in need assessments and early help services. The report noted improvements in a number of areas that are having a positive impact for local families and children.

The Great Herefordshire Spring Clean – is running from Friday 21 March – Sunday 6 April 2025, and aims to empower local communities to cut litter, improve public spaces and educate future generations on responsible waste disposal. There will be an organised litter pick on Ledbury Town Trail. People can find their local litter picking group on Herefordshire Council's website and groups can get involved by registering their interest with Balfour Beatty Living Places (BBLP) at communities@balfourbeatty.com

Parish Council Summit - the next Parish Council Summit is set to be held on Tuesday 8 April, at Plough Lane from 5.30pm. All Town Councillors and Clerks are welcome and encouraged to attend.

Local Nature Recovery Strategy - the mapping exercise with the public and groups is still live and seeking your views



on the priority areas for nature recovery in Herefordshire. They want public and landowner feedback to update the map. The information gathered will allow alterations to be made to the map. The data will also be used to help shape the priorities and measures that will be included in the written section of the strategy. <u>Parkway</u>

Following 18months of discussions with highways and BBLP to secure funds, some maintenance works and safety improvements have finally been undertaken in the Parkway area. This includes cutting, clearance of paths - and via Ledbury Town Council – funding of a speed indicator device. Next steps include improved signage, drainage works, and reinstatement of the offline section of the path from the Bullen towards Ledbury. I attended a meeting with about 30 local residents on 11th March to discuss their ongoing safety concerns and possible steps to address these.



New Street Resurfacing

Resurfacing of New Street is now scheduled for 14th to 23rd April, this will be a night closure running from 7pm to 5am each week night during this period. The impact on residents fronting the road is not underestimated but given this a key route with businesses including the Co-Op supermarket, night works were deemed the least disruptive on all users.

I have continued to report other streets for resurfacing including Biddulph Way and Martins Way which are also deteriorating in the hope these will be included in the resurfacing programme.



New Bus Stops and Service Extension

Using s106 transport funds and money from the Bus Service Improvement Plan two new bus shelters have been installed on Martins Way and Keat's Meadow on the Hawk Rise estate. Both shelters have green roofs to encourage insects. The DRM476 service will be extended to serve Hawk Rise with timetable changes and service here scheduled to come into force on 28th April (pending sign off from the Bus Commissioner).

APPROVAL OF NEW TOWN MAP & GUIDE

INTRODUCTION

- 1. A previous report to the Council in December 2024, agreed to the commissioning of copywrite, design and printing of the work to produce a new map and guide for Ledbury.
- 2. This report seeks approval to proceed with the printing of the new town map & guide for Ledbury.
- 3. There have been many iterations of the map and guide, several of which have been shared with members of the Tourism, Events and Markets Project (TEMAP), (including Councillors, Chowns, Hughes and Morris and the Clerk). The majority of the suggested amendments have been incorporated in the final version that accompanies this report.
- 4. Members of the Council will be supplied with copies of the new guide at the meeting.

ACTIONS TO DATE

- 5. Following approval to proceed with the commissioning of this work, the authors of this report have been working with the suppliers to create a fresh vibrant feel guide for Ledbury.
- Two iterations of the guide have been presented to TEMAP and comments have been feedback into the copywrite and design teams. The last iteration was presented to TEMAP on 13th March, with final adjustments being made during the week commencing 17th March 2025.
- 7. There has been considerable attention to detail in creating this guide, from the colour palette, which reflects character of the town and the colours used by Council, through to the text, providing insight, whilst not revealing all Ledbury has to offer. The photos are intended to provide a glimpse of what is available and to encourage the visitor to explore.
- 8. Contributions from Ledbury Town Traders have been invaluable and the creation of the guide has helped them to put their businesses firmly on the map. It should be noted that there is no direct advertising of the many and varied businesses in the guide, as this can become out of date too readily. There is however a QR code, which will link to Visit Herefordshire Ledbury Page, where the traders have a presence. This makes it easier to update with changes and provides the visitor with access to detailed information.

- 9. The organisations that made financial contributions to the creation of the Map and guide have their logos on the reverse of the side of the guide.
- 10. At the outset there was a requirement for Ledbury's guide to complement the Herefordshire Visitor Map. This has been completed successfully, and it has also strengthened the relationship between Herefordshire BID and Ledbury. To note, BID also contributed to the development of the Herefordshire Visitor Map.
- 11. The strengthening of this relationship has also brought other financial investments and benefits for Ledbury.
- 12. The following items are funded through Herefordshire BID and are not a cost to the Council.
 - a. A refresh of the town map and information panel in the High Street (and in Tesco car park). (£800 + VAT)
 - b. An improved presence for the Traders on the Visit Herefordshire website, so promoting Ledbury as a go-to destination, with "the best of everything" brand. (£1,500 +VAT)
 - c. The design company has obtained a quote for printing and distributing a further 15,000 more leaflets across the surrounding Counties, meaning that Ledbury will receive a wider profile, potentially attracting more visitors and improving its economic sustainability. Using this distribution method includes the provision of feedback on where leaflets are being picked up from all valuable information to understand where our visitors are coming from. (£2,628.32 +VAT)
- 13. These additions will bring Ledbury to the forefront of many more of our potential visitors, who can explore as well as find out more details about Ledbury.
- 14. The direct distribution of the additional leaflets ensures that the Council is able to maximise its distribution of its 30,000 leaflets in around the town and other significant locations closer to home. These leaflets will be stored at local venues within the town as well as at the Council offices.

RECOMMENDATIONS

15. The Council approve the new Ledbury Map & Guide to facilitate printing as soon as possible and in readiness for the 2025 season.






